## About Walla Walla Community College's IELP

Walla Walla Community College's Intensive English Language Program (IELP) supports international students who are preparing to study in a U.S. college/university or assists in reaching personal or career goals.

In our IELP, you will learn and practice Academic English skills from listening and speaking to reading, writing and grammar.

Our classes are small and interactive with focus on individual student needs. Most of our students who complete our Intensive English Language Program enroll in the 2 + 2 Transfer Program and then transfer to universities across the United States.

Attaining fluency in English and learning academic skills not only helps student achievement in college—it also gives students abilities that they take with them into their future, leading them on to successful career paths.

## Why study in our IELP?

- We have a complete English language program with 6 levels, from beginning through advanced.
- Instructors are highly qualified with degrees specific to English Language Learning and have experience teaching international students.

- No English exam, such as TOEFL/IELTS, is required to enter our IELP. Instead, students take a placement test during new student orientation to determine their IELP level.
- In Level 6, students take IELP courses plus level-100 courses for college credit, providing a bridge for students to transition from IELP into a degree program.
- Free tutoring services.

**Why did you choose WWCC?**


